Frank Lloyd Wright used his first home (1889) to explore design concepts that contain the seeds of his architectural philosophy. In his adjacent studio (1898), Wright and his associates developed a new American architecture—the Prairie style. Trained interpreters offer guided tours of the building that was the birthplace of an architectural revolution.

Nestled in grassy fields on 10.5 acres in the Sugar Creek area of Kirkwood, Missouri, the Usonian Kraus House is an excellent example of Wright’s democratic vision, intended to provide middle class Americans with beautiful architecture at an affordable cost. The home, built from 1951–55, is notable not only for its architectural integrity, but for retaining all of its original Wright-designed furnishings and fabrics.

Completed in 1908, the Westcott House is Frank Lloyd Wright’s only Prairie style home in Ohio. The house has recently undergone an inch-by-inch \$5.3 million restoration. Each of its features—from art glass to original hardware and hand-decorated walls to massive urns—has been returned to its 1908 appearance. Furniture has been rebuilt according to Wright’s specifications and gardens re-landscaped in keeping with the time.

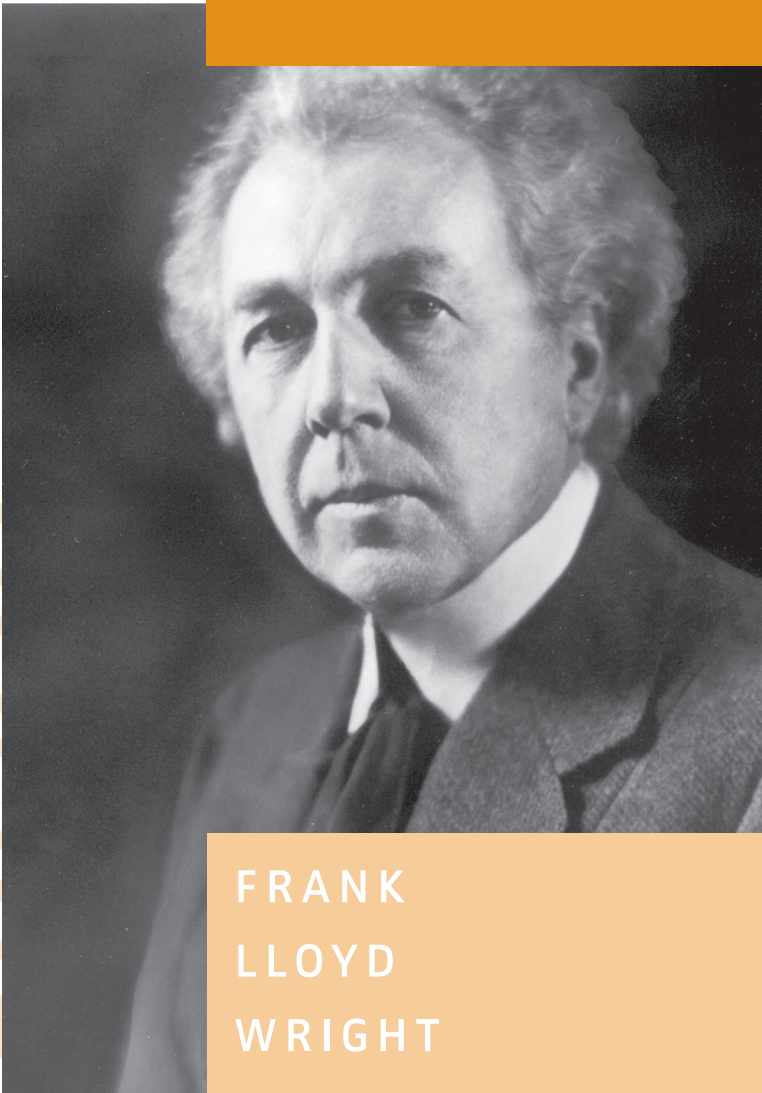

The Zimmerman House is the only residence in New England designed by the acclaimed American architect and open to the public. Frank Lloyd Wright designed the Zimmerman House in 1950, planning its gardens, its built-in and freestanding furniture, its textiles, and even the mailbox. The house offers a glimpse into the 1950s–1960s, and the private lives of Isadore and Lucille Zimmerman, who lived in the home for 36 years.

The multi-structure estate (1903-05) that Frank Lloyd Wright designed for Darwin D. Martin is a masterpiece of 20th-century architecture. Every detail of his composition reveals Wright’s genius in creating intricate harmonies: buildings and furnishings in unity with one another and with the landscape designed to support them. Wright himself referred to the Martin House complex as “the opus” and kept the site plan pinned over his drawing table for close to 50 years.

Fallingwater, a house designed in 1935 by Frank Lloyd Wright, is considered one of the masterpieces of 20th-century art. Dramatically cantilevered over a waterfall, this famous building was designated by the American Institute of Architects as “The best all-time work of American architecture.”

The Robie House has been designated by the American Institute of Architects as one of the 10 most significant structures of the 20th century. In 1963, it was the first structure designated National Landmark status based solely on its architectural merit. Designed by Wright in 1908, this precursor of modernism features an open floor plan, sweeping horizontal planes, dramatic cantilevers and long ribbons of art glass windows. Its revolutionary design remains a cornerstone of modern functional form.

The only building in Oregon designed by Frank Lloyd Wright and his only house open to the public in the Pacific Northwest, the Gordon House was designed by Wright in the Usonian tradition for Evelyn and Conrad Gordon in 1957 and built in 1964. Wright's Usonian innovations included an open floor plan, gravity floor heat, carports, cantilevered roofs with broad overhangs and floor-to-ceiling windows. The house was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 2004 and is an Oregon state treasure situated in an ancient oak grove next door to the Oregon Garden.

Hollyhock House is Wright's first Los Angeles project. Built between 1919 and 1923, it represents his earliest efforts to develop a regionally appropriate style of architecture for Southern California. Taking advantage of Los Angeles' dry, temperate climate, Hollyhock House is a remarkable combination of house and gardens. In addition to the central garden court, each major interior space adjoins an equivalent exterior space, connected either by glass doors, a porch, pergola or colonnade. A series of rooftop terraces further extend the living space and provide magnificent views of the Los Angeles basin and the Hollywood Hills.

The H.C. Price Company Tower, a 19-story National Historic Landmark completed in 1956, was Frank Lloyd Wright's pioneering experiment in the multi-use skyscraper: a tall, slim, richly detailed structure whose purpose was to combine business offices, retail and apartments. Today, Price Tower Arts Center continues to follow Wright's original multi-use design intent by offering a variety of opportunities for guests to learn from and interact with one of the master's greatest achievements. The on-going mission of the Arts Center is to provide local, regional and global audiences with the experience of great art, architecture and design.

The Solomon R. Guggenheim Museum is home to one of the world's finest collections of modern and contemporary art. This innovative building, the youngest to be designated a New York City landmark, is itself one of the greatest works of the Guggenheim collection.

In 1943, Solomon R. Guggenheim commissioned Wright to design a unique building to house his collection of avant-garde art. During the subsequent years of planning and design, Wright applied his vision of a fluid and organic architecture to the museum. Ground was broken in August, 1956, and construction was completed in 1959, six months after Wright's death.

Wright's 1908 Stockman House is the third elaboration on the floor plan of the three "Fireproof Cousins" that followed in the year after the appearance of Wright's article "A Fireproof House for \$5,000" in the *Ladies Home Journal*. None was fireproof. Their significance instead was that their floor plans expanded one's quality of life by making the conventional living boxes—living room, dining room, veranda—become one, much more meaningful, confluent space, flowing together around a central fireplace. Furnished with period Arts and Crafts furniture and Wright reproductions, the Stockman House is a little cameo of Wright's style in 1908.

Mason City is also home to the greatest concentration of Prairie School architecture in the upper Midwest.
